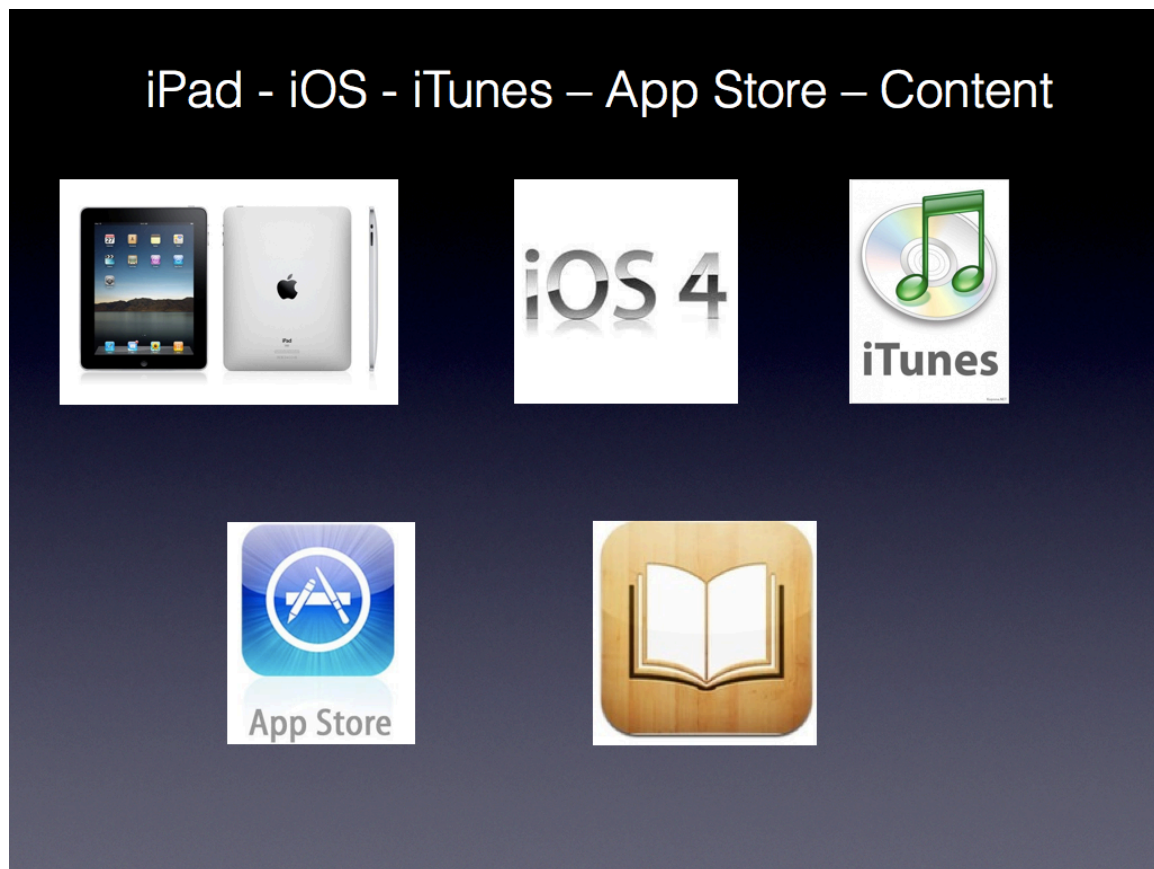

## iPad Ecosystem



### The iPad and iOS

Students will receive an iPad 2, wifi, non-3G, 16gb of internal storage

iOS – The operating system that runs on iPads (and iPhones, iPods, Apple TVs)

### iTunes

Software that allows you to move apps and files on and off the iPad

Essential for backing up (or syncing) the iPad.

Students must perform this regularly to avoid losing work.

### Apps (and the App Store)

350,000 apps available in the App Store

We've chosen about 18 for all devices and will probably add more

The school can push pre-paid apps to students

Students/parents can install other apps

Important to Note - Apps are tied to an iTunes account – Once the student has installed them, they are theirs forever.

Students will need their own iTunes account and a computer for syncing

### Content

We will be distributing content (textbooks, handouts) through a variety of methods

E-texts purchased by the school, delivered in-app

Readers, handouts published on website

We have a new Drewnet coming too – upgraded this summer to provide new and improved online tools.

## Wireless Access

Students can actually use many of the functions of different apps without wireless access. It will be helpful for teachers, students and parents to develop some understanding of when wireless is necessary.

Use email  
Check homework online  
Save documents to cloud storage  
Access any and all notes they have organized using Evernote  
Download new books on iBooks, Kindle and Course Smart  
Email notes to friends using Notes Plus  
Take eClicker quizzes  
Update news feeds  
Download new flashcard sets from Quizlet  
Translate words across multiple languages

## Without Wireless Users Can ...

Open, read and annotate documents that are already on the iPad  
Read and annotate books in iBooks, Course Smart and Kindle libraries  
Access a sub-set of notes in Evernote  
Create documents, such as essays, spreadsheets and slide presentations  
Read some news stories offline  
Take notes in class  
Use calculator and dictionary functions  
Add events and alerts the calendar

## Parental Controls

The following are instructions for enabling parental restrictions in iTunes, on iOS devices (iPhones, iPads, iPod touches), and an introduction into establishing spending restrictions on the iTunes store and Amazon's Kindle store.

These devices are primarily user-managed and allow access to the iTunes store, Amazon's Kindle store, and in-app purchases. Knowing how to enable these restrictions and control spending will be essential to using these devices.

### *iTunes*

#### Summary

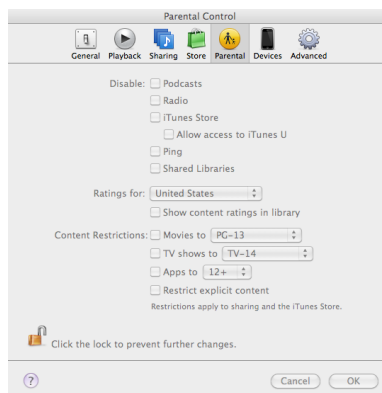
iTunes has parental controls in iTunes Preferences that allow you to set content restrictions. You must be an Administrator on the computer and your child must **not** know the Administrator password. Anyone with this Administrator password is able to edit restrictions.

#### Setting Parental Controls

To set parental controls on your computer, follow these steps:

- In iTunes, open iTunes preferences. Mac users: From the **iTunes** menu, choose **Preferences**. Windows users: On the **Edit** menu, click **Preferences**.
- Click the Parental tab.
- Select the checkbox next to any item you wish to disable or restrict.
- iTunes 7.7 or later only: To change a rating level of TV Shows, Movies and Games choose a rating level from the pop-up menu.
- Click the lock icon to prevent users from making changes.
- Type your **administrator password** in the resulting dialog, then click OK (You'll need to know the administrator's account name and password).
- Click OK to close iTunes preferences and have your changes take effect.

If you want to make changes to your restrictions, open iTunes preferences, click the Parental tab, click the lock icon, and enter your administrator password in the resulting dialog to unlock the parental controls. You can then make any desired changes.



## Devices

You can enable and adjust Restrictions on your device (iPhone, iPod touch, iPad) to prevent access to specific features or content on the device.

Locate these settings by tapping **Settings > General > Restrictions**.

### Turning on Restrictions

To Enable Restrictions, tap Enable Restrictions and enter a passcode.

The passcode will be required to make changes to these settings.

You can choose to restrict access to the following applications and features on the device:

- Safari
- YouTube
- iTunes
- Ping
- App installation
- App deletion
- Camera
- FaceTime
- Location
- Account changes
- Multiplayer games in Game Center
- Adding friends in Game Center

In addition, you can choose to prevent access to specific content types:

- In-app purchases
- Music and podcasts
- Movies
- TV shows
- Apps

### Turning off Restrictions

Tap **Settings > General > Restrictions** and enter your passcode when prompted.

Tap Disable Restrictions, then enter your passcode again.

### Note: Resetting Restrictions

Any user can *Restore* or *Reset to Factory Setting* the iPad (in iTunes), which will delete any restrictions set by any user.

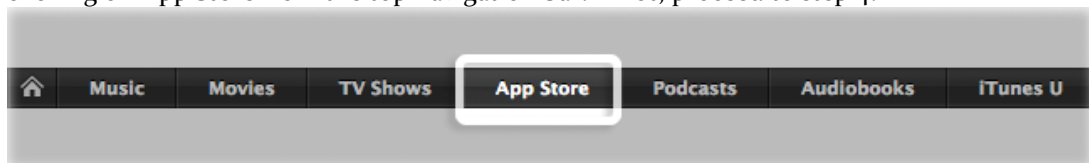

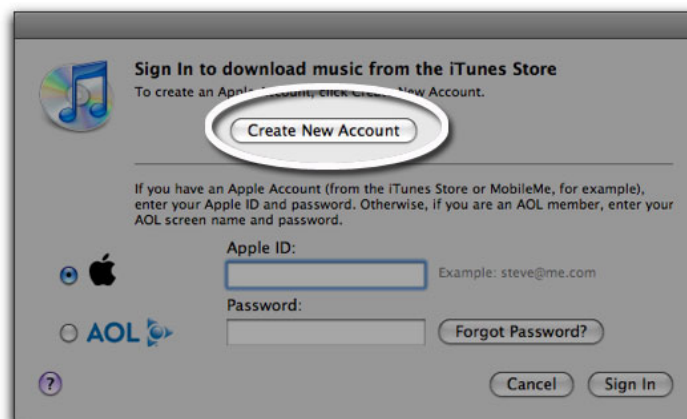
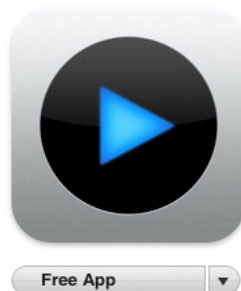
#### Setting up an Apple account without a Credit Card

To create an iTunes App Store account without a credit card please follow the steps below. *In order to create an account without a credit card, you must make sure you are in the App Store, not the iTunes Store.*

- If you already have an account, choose Store > Sign Out.
- Pick your country by clicking on the country flag located in the bottom right corner of the main iTunes Store page.
- If your country also has an iTunes Store, you'll need to navigate to the App Store by clicking on App Store from the top navigation bar. If not, proceed to step 4.



- Important: Before proceeding to the next step, you must purchase a free application by clicking Free App.

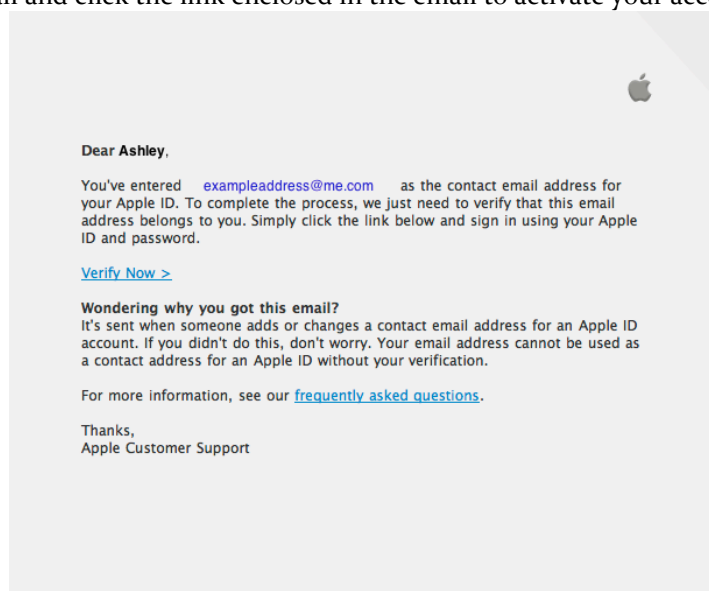


- Click create new account.
- Click Continue.

- You'll need to read and agree to the iTunes Store Terms & Conditions. Make sure you check the box next to where it says "I have read and agree to the iTunes Terms and Conditions."
- Click Continue.
- Enter your email address, create your password, continue to create and answer your security question, then enter your birthday. Click Continue.
- Select None as the payment option.

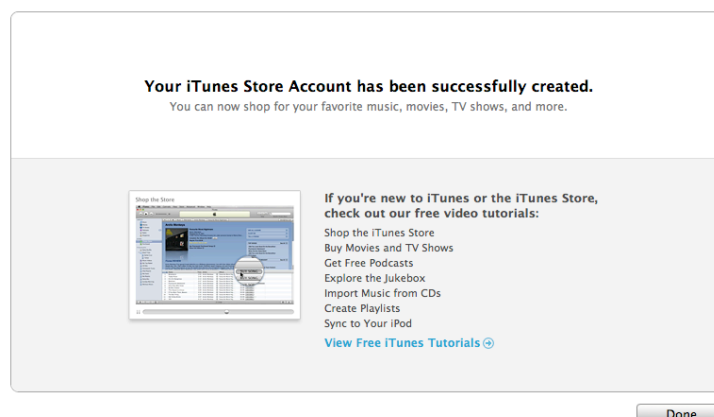


- Continue to fill out the required name and address fields.
- You'll then see a screen that says 'Verify your Account'. Click Done and then check your email for a verification email from iTunes Store.
- Open the email and click the link enclosed in the email to activate your account.



- Once you click on the link, iTunes should then prompt you to sign in with your account name and password.
- You'll then see the below "Congratulations" screen. Click Done to be taken to the App Store home page.

## Allowances

You can also automatically manage their spending using the **Allowances** option, accessed under **Buy iTunes Gifts**. An allowance will give them a fixed allotment every month. You can set it for increments from \$10 to \$200. Instead of using your credit card, they draw from their monthly allowance. Any unused funds will roll over to the next month. Your credit card is automatically charged on the first of every month and you can cancel or suspend the allowance at any time.

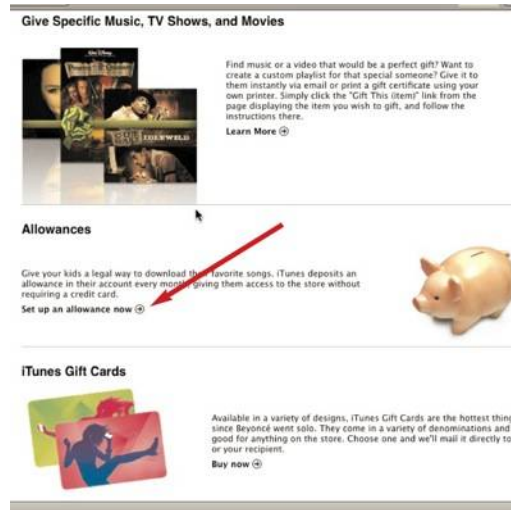
You'll need an iTunes account of your own to arrange the allowance, and that one *will* need a credit card attached. Log into the iTunes store using your own account, and you're ready to set things up for your child.

Allowance set-up is done from the iTunes Store gift page.

Find the link that says "Buy iTunes Gifts" on the right side of the storefront and click on it.



Scroll down to the section on allowances -- look for the piggy bank on the right -- and click on "Set up an allowance now."



Fill out the form to set up the allowance for your child.

**Names:** "Your name" and "Recipient's name" are for the purpose of the e-mail sent to your child announcing the allowance deposits, so you can go with the names you would use for each other, not your iTunes user names.

**Amount:** Unfortunately, you can't customize an amount, but have to choose from set figures from \$10 to \$200. Keep it to the lower end of the scale, and you can still give your child little gift certificates during the month to recognize special achievement. You can easily adjust the allowance amount later through your iTunes account information.

**First Installment:** Payments will be deposited on the first of every month. If you're doing the allowance set-up after the first, you can decide whether your child still gets a payment for the current month -- payable immediately -- or has to wait for next month's money. Be aware that the new account you will be setting up will not be available for use until that first allowance payment goes in. For immediate use, either start the allowance immediately or set up the account with a [gift card](#) instead, and add the allowance later.

**Recipient's Apple ID:** If you will be setting up a new account for your child using the rest of this step-by-step, click in the circle that says "Create an Apple Account for recipient." If your child already has an iTunes account, click on the circle that says "Use recipient's existing Apple Account," and enter the ID and password information.

**Personal Message:** Write a little something congratulating your child for hard work and earning this allowance. It will appear in the e-mail sent to your child announcing the allowance.

**Terms and Conditions:** You can scroll down and read all of the fine print; if appropriate, go over it with your child as well.

When you're done, click "Continue."

Since this allowance represents a payment from your account, you will be asked to provide your Apple ID and password again. This is the information from *your* account, not the one you will be setting up for your child. Enter the information and click on "Setup."

You'll have one last chance to make sure this allowance is something you really want to go ahead with. Check all the details. If you want to change something, click on "Back" and go through the previous steps again as needed. If everything's on-target, click on "Buy." Note that you will not actually be charged for the allowance until the first payment is made -- now, if that's the option you chose, or on the first of next month.

There should be a notification in your child's e-mail inbox announcing the allowance, the amount, the start date, and the Apple ID and password for the new account. Your child doesn't have to do anything -- the money will automatically be deposited.

In the future, if you want to change an allowance amount, suspend an allowance, remove an allowance, or start a new one, click on "Account" from the iTunes Store, then on the "Manage Allowances" button in the right column of the page, below "Purchase History." You'll find a list of allowances you pay for, and options for change.

Create a PayPhrase to provide an allowance.

To create an allowance:

- Choose a phrase for the recipient. You can do this together, or surprise the recipient with a phrase they will like
- Set a monthly spending limit and select other controls such as pre-approvals of purchases.
- Choose a shipping address to be used for orders placed with that PayPhrase.
- Select a credit card to be charged when orders are placed with that PayPhrase

Share the PayPhrase and 4-digit PIN with your teen or college student. They will be able to make purchases only within the limits you've set. You'll receive a confirmation when they place an order, and you can review purchases for the PayPhrase anytime by visiting the PayPhrase Orders page at [www.amazonpayments.com/payphrase](http://www.amazonpayments.com/payphrase) and clicking "View Orders," or by clicking the "View Orders" link at the top of this page.

If you have chosen to approve each order individually, you will receive an e-mail alert when an order is placed. Simply click the button in the e-mail to approve or decline the order -- orders will automatically be canceled after 24 hours if they are not approved. You can also opt to receive text message alerts on your mobile phone, and approve orders by responding with a text message of your own.

## Care and Feeding of the iPad

Students:

are required to bring their iPad to school every day fully charged

are not allowed to jailbreak (allows a user to unlock the device and install non-Apple apps and change locked settings) their iPad

must keep their iPad “managed” (we are running a management server that lets us push apps, and manage inventory, configuration and security settings) at all times

are allowed to install their own apps (must not *fill* with non-academic content)

are required to keep their iPad in a protective case at all times. (We have offered students the option of a Drew-provided case or one they purchase themselves.)

## Breakage, Loss, & Theft

Families will be billed for partial cost replacement if an iPad is lost, stolen or broken through negligence (negligence includes leaving the iPad lying in a hallway at Drew for example).

We realize this might make you nervous but we are trying to set up good habits with our students from day one and would like your help.. These are small devices that are easy to carry with you through the day.

---

First loss

\$150 and receive an iPad 1

Second loss

\$225 and receive an iPad 1

Third loss

\$300 plus a family meeting with Linda in the business office

Optionally: families can pay full amount for an iPad 2

(replacement would be purchased and owned by drew, family would be billed)

---

Breakage repair costs – billed cost of repair up to \$150 per incident

Get an iPad 1 as loaner device in interim

---

Optional insurance – third party device insurance

\$50 for 12 months, \$50 deductible

Covers:

Accidental Damage (includes drops/spills), Theft, Fire, Flood, Natural Disasters, Vandalism and Power Surge Due To Lightning

Regardless of insurance, the replacement device would remain a Drew-owned item

---

At the end of 3 years students will need to return the same clean, working, undamaged iPad 2.

iPads will be re-circulated

Not planning a buyout option
